In addition, there will be breakout sessions for memoir and speculative fiction, as well as a query letter workshop with agent Sara Megibow of kt literary. Every participant will be eligible to apply for a one-on-one chat about ten pages of your book with agents Sara Megibow, Sandra Bond, Noah Ballard, or Devin Ross.

The Memoir Toolkit: 5 Best Practices with Karen Auvinen

In this workshop for both new and experienced memoir writers, we'll discuss some tips on how to take your personal story and make it something sharable and universal. Please bring a notebook and pen for writing practice.

Social Commentary and Change Through Speculative Fiction with Courtney Morgan

N.K. Jemisin says, "Fantasy and science fiction are the means through which we ponder the slow ongoing revolutions of the present and foreshadow—or incite—the next revolutions to come." In this workshop, we'll look at ways writers are using speculative fiction to shift how we understand our current reality—and to imagine and incite new visions of possibility. Where speculative fiction and social change intersect we'll write and share our own speculative fiction. Each writer will leave the workshop with a richer understanding of what they're trying to describe, why, and what effect they may have on the worlds we are all able to imagine, create, and inhabit.

Secrets: Strategies for Story with Sarah Schantz

In this workshop, we will explore secrets as a major component for all storytelling. Secrets both separate and bind us. Writers will learn how to make powerful allusions in their writing to build plot and develop character. In addition to learning the art of confession, we will also explore subtext as

strategy and when and how to privilege the reader's experience. This course is open to fiction and memoir writers.

How to Hook a Reader in Your First Ten Pages with Rachel Weaver

It doesn't matter how good your book is overall if your first ten pages don't hook a reader effectively. Most agents request the first few pages to see if they want to read the rest of the book. Readers standing in a bookstore or on Amazon will often give the opening a try to decide if they want to buy your book. In this class, we'll discuss concrete ways you can ensure readers have to read your book by employing Jerome Stern's concept of position changes, effective crumbdropping, identifying your inciting incident, and what to do with that backstory. This class is open to fiction and memoir writers.

Personality Typing: A Tool for Memoir Writers with Karen Tolchin

Understanding the wide array of human personalities can help us clarify and develop our own voices in creative nonfiction. It can also help us distinguish between supporting characters so that everyone doesn't sound the same. We'll do an exercise involving the Enneagram, an ancient Greek personality-typing tool, apply these concepts to our own work, and have the opportunity for some on-the-spot feedback.

Making it All the Way to the End with Victoria Hanley

How many years does it take to write a book, and why do so many writers run into a block somewhere along the way? Whether you're writing a novel, a memoir, or a nonfiction book, there are several common issues that tend to arise while traveling the writer's path. This class will explore ways to break through those blocks, so that when they come up, you'll have some tools handy to help you reach The End.

They'll also answer any questions you have about query letters, how to stand out in the slush pile, what agents look for, how to find the right one, or anything else you've been wondering about when it comes to representation.

Please bring a draft of your query and copies for the class. Each participant will read their letter out loud and receive feedback from agent Sara Megibow about grabbing the attention of agents. We will discuss the do's and don'ts of query letters, and there will be some time for questions. All genres welcome!

Creating a Writing Habit with Tanja Pajevic

Do you find yourself starting and stopping the same piece of writing, unable to complete it? Ever notice how challenging it is to keep the thread of your story going when you can't find the time to sit down and write consistently? Through discussion and writing exercises, we'll discuss the power of creating a consistent writing habit. You'll leave with a handful of tricks for making sure that your writing routine actually works with your real, human-scaled life.

Trapped in the Body with Daniel Levine

We all a body and at nearly every moment we are subjected to its whims and appetites. Our characters have bodies too, but sometimes we forget this, so caught up in plot and dialogue and interior musings. How do we infuse this bodily awareness into our characters' perceptions and emotional responses? How do we make our readers feel like they are stuck in our characters' bodies, too? This workshop, open to writers of fiction and memoir, will help participants engage with their own physical awareness through writing exercises that will inform their understanding of character embodiment.
