Steve Almond is the author of eleven books of fiction and nonfiction, including *New York Times* bestsellers *Candyfreak* and *Against Football, Truth is the Arrow, and Mercy is the Bow* (April 2024). His debut novel, *All the Secrets of the World*, came out in 2022. The book has been optioned by 20th Century Fox and was awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. Almond co-hosted the Dear Sugars podcast with his pal Cheryl Strayed for four years, and teaches Creative Writing at the Neiman Fellowship at Harvard and Wesleyan.

Dean Bakopoulos is the author of the novels *Please Don't Come Back from the Moon*, *My American Unhappiness*, and *Summerlong*. The winner of a Guggenheim Fellowship and a NEA fellowships in both fiction and creative nonfiction, Bakopoulos is an associate professor of cinema and head of screenwriting arts at University of Iowa. He co-wrote the film adaptation of his first novel and is co-creator and executive producer of the HBO MAX series *Made for Love*. His first feature film, *Don't Come Back from the Moon*, was a *New York Times'* Critics Pick directed by Bruce Thierry Cheung and starring Rashida Jones. Bakopoulos is currently developing several original projects for television at major studios, including an adaptation of his short story, "The Dog."

She is professor of Creative Writing at the University of California-Riverside, where she also teaches in the School of Medicine. She lives in Southern California with her daughter Charlie, a cat called Meatball, and a bearded dragon called Hilda.



Mark Doty is the author of nine books of poetry, including *Deep Lane* (April 2015), *Fire to Fire: New and Selected Poems*, which won the 2008 National Book Award, and *My Alexandria*, winner of the *Los Angeles Times* Book Prize, the National Book Critics Circle Award, and the T.S. Eliot Prize in the UK. He is also the author of four memoirs: the *New York Times*-bestselling *What Is the Grass, Dog Years, Firebird*, and *Heaven's Coast*, as well as a book about craft and criticism, *The Art of Description: World Into Word*. Doty has received two NEA fellowships, Guggenheim and Rockefeller Foundation Fellowships, a Lila Wallace/Readers Digest Award, and the Witter Byner Prize. A long-time resident of Provincetown, Massachusetts, Doty teaches at Rutgers University in New Jersey.

Jane Hirshfield's ten poetry books include the newly published *The Asking: New & Selected Poems, Ledger, The Beauty, Given Sugar, Given Salt,* and *After,* named a "best book of 2006" by *The Washington Post, The San Francisco Chronicle,* and England's *Financial Times.*

Her debut memoir, *Long Live the Tribe of Fatherless Girls*, was a *New York Times* Editors' Choice selection, a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle John Leonard Prize, and a finalist for the LAMBDA Literary Award for lesbian memoir. Her debut novel, *Whidbey*, is forthcoming with Mariner, HarperCollins. Winner of the 2021 Judith A. Markowitz Award, she teaches at Mount Holyoke College, and will serve as Distinguished Writer in Residence at University of Hawai'i at Mānoa in 2024.



Amitava Kumar is a writer and journalist. He was born in Ara, and grew up in the nearby town of Patna, famous for its corruption, crushing poverty and delicious mangoes. He has published several works of nonfiction and three novels. His most recent title, *The Blue Book: A Writer's Journal,* is a collection of drawings and journal entries. Kumar's writing has appeared in *Granta, The New York Times, Harper's, Guernica, The Nation* and several other publications. He has been awarded a Guggenheim fellowship and residencies from Yaddo, MacDowell, and the Lannan Foundation. His novel *Immigrant, Montana* was on the best of the year lists at *The New Yorker, The New York Times,* and President Obama's list of favorite books of 2018. His new novel *A Time Outside This Time* was described by *The New Yorker* magazine as "a shimmering assault on the Zeitgeist." Kumar is a professor at Vassar College in upstate New York.

Nguyen's work has also appeared in numerous anthologies and publications including *The New Yorker*, *The Paris Review, The New York Times*, *Literary Hub*, *Time Magazine*, and *The Best American Essays*.



Jenny Offill's 2020 novel, *Weather*, is the story of confronting, both directly and less so, looming climate catastrophe. The book was described as "emotional, planetary, and very turbulent, "by the *New York Times*, "utterly exhilarating in its wit and intelligence" by the *Boston Globe*, and "darkly funny and urgent" by NPR. Her preceding novel, *Dept. of Speculation*, was named one of the 10 best books of 2014 by the *New York Times Book Review*, *The New Yorker*, the *Boston Globe*, and many others. It was shortlisted for the Folio Prize, the Pen Faulkner Award, and the International Dublin Award. She is also the author of *Last Things*, a *New York Times* Notable Book of the Year and a finalist for the *L.A. Times* First Book Award.



Maurice Carlos Ruffin's most recent book is the story collection, *The Ones Who Don't Say They Love You* (One World, 2021), a *New York Times* Editor's Choice, a finalist for the Ernest J. Gaines Award for Literary Excellence, and longlisted for the Story Prize. His first book, *We Cast a Shadow* (One World, 2019) was a finalist for the PEN/Faulkner Award, the Dayton Literary Peace Prize, and the PEN America Open Book Prize. It was longlisted for the 2021 DUBLIN Literary Award, the Center for Fiction Prize, and the Aspen Words Literary Prize. The novel was also a *New York Times* Editor's Choice. Ruffin is the winner of several literary prizes, including the *lowa Review* Award in fiction and the William Faulkner–William Wisdom Creative Writing Competition Award for Novel-in-Progress. His next novel is *The American Daughters*, which will be published by One World in February 2024. His work has appeared in the *New York Times*, the *LA Times*, the *Oxford American*, *Garden & Gun*, *Kenyon Review*, and *Four Hundred Souls: A Community History of African America*.

Anyone who's submitted their work to the publishing world knows about the lag times, the polite declines, and the form rejections. Here's your chance to actually sit down and chat with a literary agent or editor to find out what they thought when reading your pages.

For writers interested in taking their work to market one day, Lit Fest offers an opportunity to educate yourself about and connect with publishing professionals. Given the busy schedules of agents and editors, it's a rare chance to receive their direct feedback and advice. We also offer a limited number of meetings with editors of literary magazines for feedback on your submission, where your work may or may not fit in the literary world, and suggestions for publication.

To request a meeting with an agent, you must purchase an Advanced Workshop Plus Agent Meeting or a Gold, Weekend Gold, Silver, Bronze, or Full-Access Business Pass.

If you'd like suggestions on where to eat or go, swing by the info booth and we'll point you in the right direction.




HOW TO GET HERE
