The Truth, the Whole Truth, and Nothing but Speculation

with Harrison Candelaria Fletcher

Essayists, memoirists, and writers of hybrid nonfiction have long navigated the line between emotional truth and factual truth in search of meaning. In this hands-on, discussion-driven craft seminar, we'll clarify the distinction between invention, lying, and the use of imagination and speculation as instruments of discovery and insight. We'll explore practical strategies for making our work deeper and more complex through "perhapsing" and other techniques. PLEASE bring something to write with and prepare to discuss the short readings provided before our session.

Beyond Personal Experience: Investigation and Reporting in Narrative Writing

How do you expand and enrich the narrative in first-person writing when your personal experience doesn't illustrate all you need it to? You don't have to be a capital R reporter or capital J journalist to get people to talk to you! Reportorial skills are not innate, or "trade secrets" – anyone can report, ask questions, and gather important material to bring their narrative alive. In this craft seminar, we'll discuss basic field research, interviewing for scenes and creating a sense of place, and how to identify themes to both focus and broaden your narrative.

Writing the Memoir You Want to Write

One of the biggest challenges of memoir is managing the relationship between our voices now and who we were in the past. We spend years playing with the ideas in our memoirs, writing and rewriting, but when we get to the end, we realize that the memoir we've written isn't the book we wanted to write. The craft seminar will explore strategies for staying engaged in our own journeys and doing that hard thing that the best memoirists have mastered: aligning who "you" are now with the "you" of the past on the page.

Approaching Your Work Like True Crime

with Chris Walker

Whether it's podcasts, television series, or airport paperbacks, the media sphere is awash in true crime. Maybe you have an unsolved crime that you've been itching to solve. Or maybe you roll your eyes at our culture's fascination with all things morbid and macabre. In either case, come learn the useful techniques practiced by true crime writers that make all nonfiction better. We'll talk about weighing public interest when deciding whether to ask real people about sensitive issues, looking through records and police reports, and how to wade through contradictory facts when the stakes of a story are high.

Capture the Vibe: Mood and Memory in Nonfiction

A few song lyrics, a mention of fashion: we've all read lazy writers gesture at the feeling of the past, relying on the reader's own nostalgia-real or imagined-to summon a mood. This class will explore sharper and more eloquent ways to evoke past feelings, vibes, ecstatic moments, the way a song made you feel, or a hopelessness you hadn't yet overcome. This is the unspecific stuff of memory-not just the patterns on the curtains, but what they made you sure of, and sure you'd always be sure. We'll look at key passages from brilliant writers, try our hand at generative work, and leave better able to talk about how it felt, or they felt, or we feel.

Time Travel: Structure in Memoir

In memoir, the writer takes the reader on a journey through the past, illuminated by the present. But how do we move in time without being confusing? And how do we figure out how to arrange things when life is messy and unstructured? In this class, writers will examine excerpts that travel between past and present and then try out their techniques in several exercises. We'll look at the overall structure of several books, considering the narrative and emotional consequences of each, and talk about using nonlinear chronology to ethically negotiate gaps in memory, and how the structure of a story might trace the shape of memory itself.

Fast, Accurate, Deep: A Journalist's Guide to Time Management

Finding the time to work on a nonfiction project can be challenging; journalists have a solution. We make a living gathering information quickly, writing with accuracy, and going deep on a deadline. This workshop will explore the tools journalists use to stay organized, juggle multiple projects, and write compelling nonfiction efficiently, accurately, and with time to spare.


Some subjects feel impossible, but we're compelled to write about them anyway. Family, politics, religion, trauma, addiction, physical/mental illness, climate change, racism—any ambitious topic can slam a writer headfirst into writer's block or self-doubt. How do we write our most difficult stories without triggering a migraine, or writing drunk (not recommended), or constantly fistfighting our inner critic? In this generative, process-oriented class, we'll use tangible techniques to write about those big, difficult subjects without losing our peace of mind in the process. Writers can expect examples, discussion, and writing exercises.

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
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
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PARKING MAP
